What makes Weston Super-Mare a desirable tourist destination?

Weston-super-Mare beach offers many traditional seaside activities such as donkey rides, children's fairground rides and the Grand Pier. Weston has lots of opportunities for cups of tea, traditional seaside fish & chips, candy floss, donuts and ice-cream. It also has an annual motocross beach race and an air festival.



Where is Weston-Super Mare?

Weston Super-Mare is located on the Bristol Channel coast. It is a North Somerset town situated in South West England. Weston Super-Mare's long sandy beach has the second highest tidal range in the world.

Weston Super-Mare's History

During the second half of the 18th Century, Weston's potential for seaside holidays was noticed and the first seaside cottages were built. In the 19th Century Weston grew from a small coastal village into a well-established seaside resort. The arrival of the railway in 1841 vastly increased the development of Weston and the number of visitors.
